THE CELEBRATION OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper for the forgiveness of our sins and the strengthening of our faith. Our Lord invites to His table those who have been baptized, who repent of their sin, who believe Jesus Christ is their Savior, and who believe the body and blood of Jesus is really present together with the bread and wine. Anyone who is not yet instructed in the Christian faith or who has a differing belief are asked to first speak with one of the pastors. If you need communion delivered to where you are sitting, please notify an usher or elder before the service begins. Gluten free communion wafers are available by raising your index finger as communion is distributed signaling to the elder that you wish to receive a prewrapped gluten free wafer. Grape juice is available in the purple tinted cups located in the center of the tray of individual cups. Children or adults who have not yet been confirmed or instructed in the Lord's Supper are welcomed to come forward for a blessing placing their arms over their chest.



Reading through the New Testament—Week 40 October 8-14

Becoming more like Jesus—growing in His Word

This week's reading covers 2 Timothy and the first chapter of Titus. Along with 1 Timothy, these two letters are often referred to as the Pastoral Epistles. That title is often used for two reasons. First, Paul, shows pastoral concern for the recipients, Timothy and Titus. Second, all three deal with pastoral matters involving the care of souls and the orderly conduct of God's people in the church as well as in the world.

In 2 Timothy, Paul appears to write from prison (1:8; 2:9) where he awaits final trial and execution. It was shortly after writing 2 Timothy, Paul suffered death by beheading instigated by the madness of the Roman emperor Nero. Much of 2 Timothy is devoted to reflections on suffering. Paul urges Timothy to suffer for the sake of the gospel. This is not a wish that Timothy would land in jail like Paul, but an encouragement to be true to Christ even when the price for such fidelity is high. Paul urges Timothy to continue to proclaim the message of Christ even when others would rather not hear it.

Paul's letter to Titus stresses good works (2:7, 14; 3:1, 8, 14). These references are a valuable reminder that Paul's stress on justification "by faith apart from observing the law" (Rom 3:28) should not be taken to mean that good works are unimportant or optional. Jesus taught that those who love Him will keep His commandments (John 14:15). In the Pastoral Epistles, and especially in Titus, Paul underscores this truth.

Belonging in Community

Shame is one of the first emotions mentioned in the Bible. When Adam and Eve sinned and ate from the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, they became ashamed. (Genesis 2:25, 3:3-8)

As with Adam and Eve the power of shame is something used to separate us from God and place on us a new identity. Can you imagine what it would feel like to be completely seen? You may be thinking of the nakedness mentioned in Genesis, but go beyond that. Your every thought, intention, action, and inaction. Your finances, and your internet searches, your eating habits, your desires, and your expectations of others and yourself. Go beyond those embarrassing habits or moments that are comparatively easy to talk about and bring to mind those things that you would never mention to anyone.

• Take a moment and think about what it would feel like to be seen in this way and take the brave step to share what that brings to mind for you.

When we think of being seen in this way we often consciously or subconsciously begin to build up walls to avoid having to face these areas.

• What are ways that you build up walls and defenses around areas that bring you shame?

We know that God sees us deeply, but we don't often engage Him in those deep places. You have a chance to do that with each other now. Take some time for each person to hear these words.

"The scriptures tell us over and over that <u>(NAME)</u> you are loved. All those things you have just now been thinking about, God has seen and He has forgiven. Because of the power of His love He has redeemed you and given you belonging and purpose."

What was it like to hear those words?

This is the shame breaking power of God. And in 2 Timothy 7-9 we learn what we are to do with this truth. We can speak to the "Good News" of what His love means for us. In the salvation of the cross and the power of daily redemption that we receive because of it. Who can you share this with today?
