

WELCOME AND OPPORTUNITIES

Theme of the Day: This week's reading takes us from Titus 2 through Hebrews 2, including the whole book of Philemon. Today we will look at Philemon, a book we don't normally spend much time on, and learn what it means to have a heart refreshed in Christ (Philemon 1:20).

INVOCATION AND CALL TO WORSHIP (Colossians 3:10-14)

- P: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

We have not loved You with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We justly deserve Your present and eternal punishment. For the sake of Your Son, Jesus Christ, have mercy on us. Forgive us, renew us, and lead us, so that we may delight in Your will and walk in Your ways to the glory of Your holy name. Amen.
- Almighty God, in His mercy, has given His Son to die for you and for His sake forgives P: you all your sins. By the authority of Jesus Christ, I announce to you the forgiveness of your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.

THE CELEBRATION OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper for the forgiveness of our sins and the strengthening of our faith. Our Lord invites to His table those who have been baptized, who repent of their sin, who believe Jesus Christ is their Savior, and who believe the body and blood of Jesus is really present together with the bread and wine. Anyone who is not yet instructed in the Christian faith or who has a differing belief are asked to first speak with one of the pastors. If you need communion delivered to where you are sitting, please notify an usher or elder before the service begins. Gluten free communion wafers are available by raising your index finger as communion is distributed signaling to the elder that you wish to receive a prewrapped gluten free wafer. Grape juice is available in the purple tinted cups located in the center of the tray of individual cups. Children or adults who have not yet been confirmed or instructed in the Lord's Supper are welcomed to come forward for a blessing placing their arms over their chest.

Becoming more like Jesus—growing in His Word

Titus

Excerpt from OliveTree Bible Overview | Titus Introduction:

Written around the same time as 1 Timothy, Paul wrote this letter between AD 62-67. The letter is addressed to Titus, his ministry companion whom he had charged with setting up church leadership on the Mediterranean island of Crete. Paul gives Titus directions for establishing overseers and practical advice for church conduct. Paul focuses on the issues of good works and sound doctrine in Titus, addressing people in the church who were living for personal gain. Paul emphasizes to Titus the importance of living pure Christian lives in the light of God's grace and salvation.

Philemon

Excerpt from OliveTree Bible Overview | Philemon Introduction:

Philemon is another of Paul's "Prison Epistles" and is written expressly to an individual. Philemon was a Christian in the church at Colossae. Onesimus, a slave of Philemon, had robbed Philemon and run away to Rome, where he evidently met Paul and became a Christian. Paul wrote to Philemon asking him to accept Onesimus back into his household, though not as a slave but as a brother in Christ. Philemon would have been within the law to execute his slave for his actions, but Paul urged him to forgive Onesimus. Philemon is a message of reconciliation not just for Philemon and Onesimus, but for all Christians, whether Jew or Gentile, slave or free.

Historical Context

A city in the Roman province of Asia (modern-day Turkey), Colossae was located along the Lycus River just east of Ephesus, about 10 miles from Laodicea, and 14 miles from Hierapolis. At the time of Paul, the area was thick with mysticism, idol worship and high-influence oriental religions. The people worshipped angels and esteemed asceticism, adding unnecessary practices to faith in Christ.

Paul likely did not visit the city, since he says that the churches of Colossae and Laodicea had not seen him "face to face" (Col. 2:1). The church may have instead started through the evangelism of Epaphras, who came to Paul from Colossae.

Additional Reflections from this week's reading

Titus: The book of Titus was written as an encouragement. In light of this, where do you see the book:

Philemon: See sermon notes. What out of the book of Philemon connects into your life:

Hebrews: The letter to the Hebrews was written to encourage Christians in a time of trial. It does so by focusing on the absolute supremacy and sufficiency of Jesus Christ. What in the first two chapters in Hebrews connects into your life:

$oldsymbol{Blessing}$ the World

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations... Matthew 28:19

During the winter months it can be hard to get to know your neighbors but if you look for the strengths of your community you can find ways. Do you have a library, grocery store, or restaurant that you routinely visit? How is that an asset to your community? And how can you get to know people in those places this winter? Write down your answers and be intentional as the weather changes.

Belonging in Community

Connect Groups are a group of Christians who meet together regularly where we intentionally share in our faith walk. Connection is created through commitment and presence in fellowship, discussion, and prayer.

- Begin your time together by following up on anything that was shared during your last time together.
- Take some time to share any reflections or aha's you had from your readings.

Eating a meal together was an integral part of the fellowship of the early church. This practice of sharing time, space, and food is more than a metaphor; it is a continuation of the way Jesus lived in this world. Can you recall stories where Jesus was sharing a meal with someone? Eating meals together is a means to deep connection and belonging. Yet this practice is becoming increasingly less common in our daily lives.

What does sitting down for a meal look like in your life? (who cooks, how often, who is at the table...)

Jesus not only sat down and had meals with people, scripture is intentional in showing us who Jesus ate with. Can you recall what type of people and who Jesus is recorded having meals with? It is likely you will say, "sinners and tax collectors." (Matthew 9:11) You would not be wrong, however try to dig a little deeper and see if you can recall any of those specific stories. (If you want to read a couple you can look at Mark 2:15, Luke 5:29, or Luke 19)

How is this countercultural even in today's practices?

Is it realistic for us to invite a community of "sinners and tax collectors" to sit down with us?

What could that look like in...
Our church?
Your home?

As you talk, take a moment to make this more than a discussion. What are one or two action steps you can take to invite someone to your table?
