Theme of the Day: When was the last time you rested, truly rested? It may very well be difficult to find time to rest these days depending on the many things that require our attention. When the Bible talks about rest, it's not merely talking about taking an afternoon nap on the couch. This weekend, we will turn to one of the chapters we are reading this week that includes Hebrews 4 where the writer of Hebrews talks about a "Sabbath-rest."

#### Reading through the New Testament—Week 42

October 22-28

### **Becoming** more like Jesus—growing in His Word

Our reading last week started us in to the book of Hebrews, but this week covers Hebrews 3-7. The book of Hebrews is in a category of letters in the New Testament often referred to as the "General Epistles." The General Epistles include Hebrews, James, 1 & Peter, 1-3 John, and Jude. They are referred to as the General Epistles because they appeal either to no specific audience or to an audience whose exact identity is somewhat broad or vague.

Maybe the first thing to consider in looking at Hebrews is to identify the author. And the answer is, we don't know who the author is. The writer of Hebrews is not identified. There are some over the years, however, who have believed the author is Paul, although that is not widely accepted. For one thing, Hebrews is written in a Greek style that seems different from Paul's.

There was an episode of Jeopardy not too long ago where the question was asked which of Paul's New Testament writings contained the most Old Testament references. The officials at Jeopardy believed the answer to be Hebrews. Consequently, there were many people who challenged that because Paul is not the author of Hebrews, but the folks at Jeopardy wouldn't back down (although they were wrong).

Many believe that Hebrews was written to a Jewish audience, as its name would suggest. If Hebrews was written to Jewish Christians, why? Well, it seems that the author wrote to warn his readers not to turn back to Judaism and to encourage them to stay true to faith in Jesus Christ. In doing so, the writer reminds his readers of the incomparable greatness of Jesus Christ (1:1-10:18).

# **Belonging** in Community

As we gather together we are going to dive into the topic of Sabbath.

Sabbath is a word that can have a lot of assumptions, rituals, and misconceptions around it. When you hear "Sabbath" what expectations, teachings, and practices come to mind?

Too often Sabbath becomes a day for rules and "should nots". The Pharisees are a good example of how this can grow into something other than what God intended. A spiritual practice of Sabbath keeping is about dedicating time to living into the promise that through the work of Jesus the end of our story is eternity in the Promised Land of His kingdom. We get to celebrate, connect and dwell with God and others and rest. Setting up boundaries to resist the call of the hurried life around us will be necessary but it's not a day for "shoulds". Failing to practice the Sabbath will not bring condemnation on you. This is an invitation. An invitation from your God into restoration and connection with Him.

How is this idea different from the list you shared above?

You are encouraged to strengthen your Sabbath practices. Here are a few points to discuss as you ponder what this could look like.

What is a good day for you to practice a Sabbath?

How can you be intentional about connecting with God on your Sabbath?

How can you be intentional about connecting with others on your Sabbath?

You will likely have to set boundaries for yourself such as no purchasing, making your meals at home, setting aside technology, etc. What would be some good boundaries for you? Choosing activities that restore vs. activities that entertain, distract, or numb is important.

Which of these activities would be restorative for you?

Take walks

Get lost in a book

Nap

Play board/card games
