THE CELEBRATION OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper for the forgiveness of our sins and the strengthening of our faith. Our Lord invites to His table those who have been baptized, who repent of their sin, who believe Jesus Christ is their Savior, and who believe the body and blood of Jesus is really present together with the bread and wine. Anyone who is not yet instructed in the Christian faith or who has a differing belief are asked to first speak with one of the pastors. If you need communion delivered to where you are sitting, please notify an usher or elder before the service begins. Gluten free communion wafers are available by raising your index finger as communion is distributed signaling to the elder that you wish to receive a prewrapped gluten free wafer. Grape juice is available in the purple tinted cups located in the center of the tray of individual cups. Children or adults who have not yet been confirmed or instructed in the Lord's Supper are welcomed to come forward for a blessing placing their arms over their chest.



Reading through the New Testament—Week 43 October 29-November 4

Becoming more like Jesus-growing in His Word

This week's reading continues in the letter to the Hebrews. As you continue your reading of Hebrews, it should be noted that Hebrews' obvious criticisms of certain attitudes and practices of Old Testament characters do not constitute a dismissal of Old Testament faith. Instead, Hebrews attacks a false conception of faith in God that too often prevailed in Old Testament times, not the Old Testament or its message itself.

It is a false understanding of the Old Testament that the writer of Hebrews criticizes. He exposes misuse of Old Testament institutions in order to point to Christ and His ministry, which was foreshadowed in the Old Testament. Obviously, the days of animal sacrifice and high priestly ritual are things of the past now. But, while not setting the Old Testament aside, the writer of Hebrews calls his readers to ponder its message in light of God's dramatic revelation of Jesus Christ.

At the time it was written, there were Jewish Christians facing the temptation to turn away from Christianity and back to their Jewish religion. Furthermore, Christianity had been outlawed when Nero began his religious persecution. The pressure to revert to the safety of Judaism was very real and grew even more so as the persecution heated up.

Over the years since then, some have shied away from the book of Hebrews seeing it as one of the most difficult in the New Testament to comprehend. But it's beauty is that it demonstrates the supremacy of Christ and presents Him as God's perfect word to man and man's perfect representative with God.

Belonging in Community

- Begin your time together by following up on anything that was shared during your last time together.
- Take some time to share any reflections of aha's you had from your reading.

This month we will be diving into the stewardship idea of "Count Me In." As we continue our way through Hebrews we encounter chapters 10-12. These chapters talk about the reassurance and confidence we have because of Christ (Ch 10). Help us to remember those whose faith lives are shared in the Bible to give us examples of what it looks like to live lives by faith ourselves (Ch 11). And from this gives a rousing call to action that is focused on and grounded in Christ (Ch 12).

• Take a moment to look at these chapters through the lens of being called to living in faith. Share the sections are inspiring to you?

Living by faith is intended to be a call to boldness and greatness. When you hear the phrase "be bold" what comes to mind? Is it comfortable, nerve racking, burdensome, exciting?

This call to live boldly is not for ourselves, but to the Glory of Christ. It is also not meant to be an initiative or one time act. It is meant to be a part of the character of a life in Christ. How do you already do this, or what can you adjust in your life so that when people interact with you they leave impacted by the love and truth of Christ?

As you close - talk about how you can hold each other accountable to the things you talked about today and then close in prayer for each other.
