Reading through the New Testament—Week 45

November 12-18

Becoming more like Jesus—growing in His Word

This week we will begin reading in 1 Peter. Both 1 and 2 Peter are written by the apostle Simon Peter (1 Peter 1:1; 2 Peter 1:1, 16, 18). He is one of the best known figures in the early church, mentioned over 150 times in the New Testament. He grew up in Bethsaida along the coast of the Sea of Galilee, where he and his brother Andrew were fishermen (John 1:44).

Peter was introduced to Jesus by his brother Andrew and given a new name (Jn 1:40-42). His original name was Simon, but Jesus renamed him Peter – *Petros*, meaning "rock." Later, Peter was called by Jesus (Mark 1:16-18) and appointed as one of the original twelve disciples (Mark 3:13-16). He became part of an inner circle (along with James and John) that surrounded Jesus in His ministry.

Generally speaking, 1 Peter was written to comfort and encourage believers. Peter himself was facing imminent death as were many others to whom he was writing. For their suffering and persecution, Peter encouraged them to "rejoice" (1:6; 4:13). He reminded them that Christ also suffered and they were participating in the very sufferings of Christ. Most of us would want to avoid suffering and persecution at all costs. However, the apostle Paul reminds us, "Everyone who wants to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted" (2 Timothy 3:12), so it should not surprise Christ's followers if the world seeks to bring insult and injury to us. After all, we are "aliens and strangers in this world" (1:1; 2:11) and our true home is elsewhere.

Peter also provides some practical things to say about living the Christian life in a fallen and hostile world. In some places, Peter has specific instruction for specific people: husbands and wives (3:1-7), elders in the church (5:1-4), and young people (5:5). Peter acknowledges here that in our own strength it would be impossible as he describes. It is only the grace of God Himself and the power of Christ within that can make believers strong, firm, and steadfast (5:10).

Additional Reflections from this week's reading

James 5 | Patience is often something many of us don't do well with. What does James say about patience in this chapter? What are we to be patient for? What is our posture to be while we wait (5:8-9)?

1 Peter 1 | Look closely at the five commands Peter mentions in vv. 13-15. What reason does Peter give for these commands (vv. 17-21)?

1 Peter 2 | If you were a war correspondent reporting from the front lines, how would you describe the war going on within yourself (v. 11)? Take a moment and bring that struggle to God right now in prayer and commit your struggle to Him. After you do that, reread the words of 2:9-10.

1 Peter 3 | As you read vv. 15-16, what do you have to say about "giving the reason for the hope that you have"? As you have opportunity to share that with others, remember always the directive of v. 16.

1 Peter 4 | As you read vv. 12-19, what form does your suffering for Christ take? How has such suffering impacted your life, and especially your life of faith?

$oldsymbol{Blessing}$ the World

Jesus said: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: Love your neighbor as yourself." Mark 12:30-31

Oftentimes we take for granted that we know who are neighbors are but do you know your neighbors or the gifts that are in your neighborhood? One of the ways to start getting to know (or getting better insights) your neighbors is by going for a walk. Spend three days this week going for a walk in your neighborhood and see how many people you can greet and if you can find two places that are blessings to have in your neighborhood (ie, parks, grocery stores, libraries). Spend time after each walk writing down your observations and who you meant on your walk. To learn more about getting to know your neighborhood, ask Pastor Shawn for a Hopeful Neighborhood Project journal.

Belonging in Community

Connect Groups are a group of Christians who meet together regularly where we intentionally share in our faith walk. Connection is created through commitment and presence in fellowship, discussion, and prayer.

- Begin your time together by following up on anything that was shared during your last time together.
- Take some time to share any reflections of aha's you had from your reading.

Love as defined by scripture is often very different that how we use the word in everyday life and how we see it defined in the media.

When you tell someone you love them what does that mean?

Take some time to discuss the actions and heart postures that define love in 1 Corinthians 13, John 15:13, John 14:23.

How does the scriptures picture of love compare to what you mean when you say you love someone?

Compare the scriptures picture of love to when God says He loves us in Deuteronomy 7:7-9, Isaiah 61:8, Mark 10:21, John 14:31. What do you notice?

What small steps can you continue to make to love like God has shown and instructed us to love?
