THIRD SUNDAY IN ADVENT December 17, 2023

WELCOME AND OPPORTUNITIES

Theme of the Day: Tucked in the middle of the book of Revelation (chapter 12) is a story that points to the birth of Jesus, the reason He was born, and His victory over sin and Satan. Reading this story during the season of Advent reminds us of the reason for this season and reason for our joy (Joy is the third candle that we light this week on the Advent tree) at Christmas.

INVOCATION AND CALL TO WORSHIP

- P: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

- P: Before we read from Revelation 12 today, let us remember the apostle Paul's words to us in Ephesians 6; "Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes.

- ALL: And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests."

Reading through the New Testament—Week 50 December 17-23

Becoming more like Jesus-growing in His Word

Once again, we turn to some general introductory information about the book of Revelation. From the early days of the church, Revelation was turned to in times of persecution as a source of strength and encouragement. A few additional guidelines may be helpful in reading the book.

Revelation consists of a long and complicated series of visions – over sixty of them. They need to be read for what they are: visionary accounts of reality that were given by God to portray profound spiritual and theological truths. It's also important to remember that the images John used were familiar to the people of his day, even if they aren't to us. Most of them come from the Old Testament – there are about 350 allusions or references to the Old Testament.

As mentioned previously, the style of writing that John used was familiar to his readers. It was called apocalyptic, and John's readers were able to digest much of what he was saying because they were used to reading that sort of literature. As a literary style, apocalyptic was highly symbolic. For instance, the beasts, dragons, and even dissolving universes were pictorial representations of deep historical and theological realities. They were familiar to John's readers, coming as they did from well-known books in the Old Testament such as Exodus, Psalms, Ezekiel, Daniel, Isaiah, and Zechariah.

Overall, basic Christian theology is woven throughout the book. That gives it an inner coherence and unity that ties it together. As you read, try not to get completely enthralled (or entangled) by the symbols; but understand that there is theological truth being presented.

Additional Reflections from this week's reading

Revelation 9 | Beginning in chapter 8, we read where John describes catastrophes that will accompany the end times. With that in mind, we would do well to heed the advice of the apostle Paul to "take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming darts of the evil one" (Eph 6:16). And remember that our enemy, the devil, is already defeated by the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Revelation 10 | If the angel with the golden censer in 8:3 is identified as Jesus, it is even more probable that the "mighty angel coming down from heaven" (10:1) is Jesus too. The disciples were surrounded by a cloud at Jesus' transfiguration (Lk 9:34), and Jesus said that He would return "in a cloud with power and great glory" (Lk 21:27). The other descriptions here also point to Jesus – a rainbow encircles the throne of God (4:3), the Lamb is standing in the center of the throne (5:6), the angel's face shone like the sun, just as did Jesus at His transfiguration (Mt 17:2).

Revelation 11 | Jesus asked John to measure the temple and observe the two witnesses at work. In this way John was assured that the work of sharing the message of the little scroll was not his alone. Bringing the gospel to the world is the mission of every believer until the Savior returns.

Revelation 12 | This chapter marks the beginning of John's fourth vision of his seven visions. This fourth vision covers the same time that the second and third visions did. The vision of the seven visions depicts events from the beginning of the New Testament age until the last days and the final judgment.

Revelation 13 | Here we read where the devil enlists the aid of a hideous beast to bolster his attacks against God and His people. Such a beast represents worldly power and political authority that has gone awry.

Blessing the World

This week as you reflect on John's Revelation, we also spend time reflecting on this season of expectant waiting the celebration of Christmas. This week spend 30 minutes sitting in that place - reflecting on the first and second coming of Christ. Are there people who came to mind as you reflected? Can your reflection open a conversation that might bless that person? As we open conversations and listen to those around us, who God puts on our hearts, we have an opportunity to be a "witness". (Acts 1:8)

Belonging in Community

As we ponder the reading in Revelation we read of Satan as the "deceiver" of the whole world.

Take some time to read all the way back in Genesis 3:1-6. We often look at this section of scripture as the first sin. Ponder that this also shows us the first deception of humans. "Did God really..."

What are some deceptions that you can recall throughout the rest of scripture?

How did these deceptions affect humanity?

What deceptions do you experience today? Especially in your personal relationships?

Now read through Revelation 12:9-12.

One great prophecy in Revelation is that the originator of deception will be destroyed. Deception and the effects of it will be no more.

What do you imagine a life without deception will be like?

What a glorious and wonderful existence that will be! As you close, take time to praise God for the promises he gave to us throughout the book of Revelation and pray for faith to remain until that day.
