CONNECT with Pastor Goff

When Laura and I went to Alaska this summer with my brother and his wife, the three of them were anxious to see the **aurora borealis** or "northern lights". (Notice I didn't put myself in that group because I knew that would require getting up at an hour of the night when I wanted to be asleep!)

However, if you have ever seen them or if you have seen any pictures of them, the aurora borealis are really spectacular. In case you are interested, the aurora borealis are potentially visible under dark skies from late August to mid-April. A clear and cloudless sky are the best conditions and the strongest lights tend to appear between 9:00p-2:00a, although the best viewing is apparently between 11:00p and midnight. Typically, they are



more likely visible in the northern parts of Canada, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Alaska, Russia and Iceland. We were in Alaska in late August, so potentially they would have been viewable then but we didn't see them (at least I didn't because I was asleep!)

I'm thinking about this "light in dark" image as I think about the theme we are focusing on during the season of Lent and Easter this year, "The Death of Darkness, Liberating Light". Maybe the presence of, or feeling of, darkness makes you uncomfortable. Maybe it causes you to feel scared. There probably aren't a lot of people who actually like darkness (unless you are trying to sleep). But sometimes, just like with the aurora borealis, you can't see the light of something unless it is dark.

For all practical purposes, the season of Lent is a season of darkness. But actually, that's okay. If the season of Lent is intended to be a season of repentance and reflection, we can really only do that when we see how dark our sin really is. For our six mid-week Lent services we will focus on the themes of:

- Feb 14 The Heart of Darkness (Ash Wednesday)
- Feb 21 The Darkness of Denial
- Feb 28 The Darkness of Disconnection
- Mar 6 The Darkness of Doubt
- Mar 13 The Darkness of Despair
- Mar 20 The Darkness of Deception




I know that looks like a lot of darkness. But at the end of those 40 days, we will be eager and all the more prepared to see the light, the light of the victory and resurrection of Jesus. Maybe some of us would rather skip the darkness and go straight to the light. But truly, the light of Easter is all the brighter when you come out of the darkness.

One of the hymns we will sing, probably several times, throughout Lent is, "Praise the One Who Breaks the Darkness" (LSB 849). The first stanza begins, "Praise the One who breaks the darkness with a liberating light." It is the liberating light of the resurrection that pulls us all out of the darkness of our sin. The last stanza of the hymn is:

Let us praise the Word Incarnate, Christ, who suffered in our place. Jesus died and rose victorious that we may know God by grace. Let us sing for joy and gladness, seeing what our God has done. Let us praise the true Redeemer, praise the One who makes us one.

If it wasn't for the darkness (of reflecting on our sinful nature), the light (of Jesus' forgiveness) may not seem all that bright.

You may already know this, but Easter is early this year (March 31). Don't miss the opportunity to prepare for the "liberating light" of the resurrection by first stepping into the darkness of Lent.

BRIDGING THE GAP

As the weather has changed into an Indiana winter, we often find ourselves hunkered down and not wanting to do much, if anything. It certainly does not seem the prime season to start something new. However, in Ecclesiastes we read "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens (3:1)." For the Bridge Ministry, it is a season of discovery. Discovering who is leaning in (see January 7 Sermon - Leaning In, on YouTube). Discovering expectations of young adults. Discovering new places and ways to connect with the community of Fort Wayne. I am excited by the new opportunities and challenges that lay ahead as we work towards training up, coaching, and mentoring young adults to lead young adults.

Did you know: SpringTide Research Institute puts out a "State of Religion and Young People" study every year to help faith leaders (and congregations) better understand how to connect with young people. In 2020, the research developed around the term Relational Authority, and the impact trusted seasoned adults (who strive to have a relationship with young people) have on their lives. Research shows that spending time, actively listening, and engaging young people in honest and authentic conversations, helps build relationships and in turn helps them hear from the authority figures in their lives in a more receptive way.

How can you be intentional, connect, and build relationships with people who are leaning in to know more about you and your story (especially about being connected to Jesus)? Here are some ideas:

- Pray for them weekly
- Invite them to share a meal
- Write a letter of encouragement to them
- Ask them open ended questions or inquiries when you connect:
 - o Tell me about your week.
 - O What are you passionate about?
 - O What obstacles are you facing right now?
 - O How can I help you?

Redemption House is a network of transition homes for women who desire to redeem their lives from past destructive behavior by developing a faith-based lifestyle and by gaining the skills necessary to achieve and maintain success.

Women residents are assigned to Redemption House by the courts as an alternative to jail. During a six-month residency at Redemption House, women work to develop job skills, find freedom from addictions, and mend broken relationships. As a Christian community, we grow together in faith and positive lifestyle choices.

Redemption House forms partnerships with local agencies, organizations, businesses, churches, and individuals to carry out our important mission. We rely on the expertise and generosity of allies who believe in what we do.

I have been going through the history of St. Michael as part of our **70th Jubilee Celebration** and found an article in the Fort Wayne News Sentinel from 1958 titled "Churches One of the Greatest Outlets of Modern Music". Here are a few excerpts from the article:



Next to the schools, Fort Wayne churches provide the greatest outlet for the musical talents of residents of the city. With little or no glory, loyal groups of singers each week rehearse the music which will be presented in the worship services in most of the city's approximate 130 churches on Sunday morning. The role of music in the church has been constantly growing in importance through the years. Many adults still sing at no other time during the week- only during the church services. But the churches are working to promote the joy of singing through the organization of choirs of many age levels. Raising the standards and tastes of the congregation through artistically-presented sacred music, the churches make a real contribution to the cultural life of the community. This musical is directed by Mr. Chris Murphy, with musical direction by Mrs. Kathryn Peperkorn.

MENTAL WELLNESS SERIES AT ST. MICHAEL


