CONNECT with Pastor Goff

For those of you who have attended one of our Town Hall Meetings to discuss a restructure of the governance model at St. Michael, **thank you!** As I'm writing this, there are a few more town hall opportunities left. Whether you have attended one or not so far, please continue to share any questions you may have for greater clarification.

This process started last Fall when our Church Council approved working with the consultant, Jim Galvin. A LCMS church member himself, Jim has worked with many LCMS churches and ministry organizations on governance. Jim spent a day with our Church Governance Task Force last November. Prior to that day, the Task Force read his book, *Maximizing Board Effectiveness: A Practical Guide for Adaptive Governance*. The Task Force gleaned helpful insights in understanding the ins and outs of church governance.

I'm a visual learner and the opening exercise Jim did with us that day was eye opening for me. He asked each of us to draw out the current organizational structure for our church. After about 10-15 minutes, we looked at one another's and realized everyone drew something different. What that said to me is that whatever system we have right now is not well understood.

As our congregation goes through this process, I think there are a couple **goals** we have. For one thing, as the above illustration suggests, **clarity** is needed in how things operate especially in relationship between the church council and the staff. Secondly, the proposed governance model will provide for greater **accountability** for both staff and congregational leadership.

In addition to the governance review we are going through, the Church Council recently authorized a Facility Review Task Force. The purpose of this task force is to examine the entire campus and overall **facility needs** for both the church and school. As of this writing, we will have met twice. As the process moves along, there will be opportunity for the congregation to identify priorities.

The above two efforts, Church Governance Task Force and the Facility Review Task Force, address areas I heard expressed during the call interview for senior pastor. These are both areas (and there are others too) that I clearly heard needed attention.

In addition to the above efforts...

There is no greater priority for us than what we will celebrate as a church the end of this month... the resurrection of Jesus!

It is the victory of Jesus, God's Son, over sin and death and hell that the church is here. For each of us, new life is offered, forgiveness is given, and salvation has been won. We now live at peace with God through the victory of Jesus whose death and resurrection atoned for our sins. If it wasn't for Easter, the church would not be here. Everything we do, everything we do, revolves around the resurrection of Jesus!

It's because the resurrection of Jesus is our purpose for being the church, we want to continually look at the ways in which we carry out the church's ministry as efficiently and effectively as possible. I pray that nothing we ever do deters us from the one thing that brings us together – Jesus.

THE BRIDGE MINISTRY

Over the past 6 months, I have the joy and privilege of being a part of a learning cohort through the Fuller Youth Institute (FYI) focused on Young Adult Ministry. As we looked at realigning my call back to a concentration on Young Adults (YA), I thought it could be fruitful to sit with other church leaders from other denominations who are trying to figure out the same thing we are - how do we reach the missing generations in the church. The six months were filled with coaching calls, assessments, and learning times with the cohort. Sadly, our time came to a conclusion last month.

Here are some things I have taken away from my time with FYI:

- Young adults throughout the country are eager to have spiritual conversations
- More than likely, YA will not initiate the spiritual conversations
- Many YA are seeking people "who have been there and done that" to help guide them
- 85% of YA said that if they were asked, they would be interested in having a conversation and getting to know someone who was older than them

Throughout the six months a common theme came up through the assessments and our cohort conversations. Young Adults want to be a part of things but need a personal invitation. They may be in a season where they are not able to do everything. However, they recognize to have a sense of belonging, they need to do something.

Over the course of this month you can make a difference in the life of a Young Adult. Be intentional. Connect with someone in your life and invite them to coffee, go for a walk, or have a meal. And be sure to invite them to sit with you for Easter Worship!

YOUNG ADULT GATHERINGS

The Bridge Ministry is working towards helping young adults connect deeper into God's Word and to each other. How? Setting up a monthly time, place, and space to gather young adults from St. Michael, Emmanuel, and the community. We were blessed to find the Upper Room at Electric Works' GE Club that we were able to rent at a discounted rate. This past Sunday we had 17 people who gathered as we talked about Kairos moments, John 5, and played games. We are planning to have these gatherings monthly in the Upper Room (at the GE Club).

Our next gathering is Sunday, March 25 from 4:00p-6:00p. If you know someone who might be interested, feel free to pass along the information or let me (Pastor Shawn) know and I will connect with them to personally invite them!

HOLY WEEK WORSHIP

WHAT TO EXPECT OF HOLY WEEK AT ST. MICHAEL

Holy Week is a season of the Church calendar that includes Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter worship services. This week in the church year is a favorite of many.

Palm Sunday Weekend (March 23/24) We celebrate Jesus' final entry into Jerusalem. Palm branches will be handed out as we recount the celebration of the coming of a king, all the while knowing he arrives to provide the ultimate sacrifice in his death on the cross for us.

Maundy Thursday (March 28 at 11:00a and 7:00p) We remember Jesus' Passover meal with his disciples. At this meal, he also instituted the practice of communion. We remember the darkness of desertion, as later that evening the disciples left Jesus. Purple is the color of the cloth that adorns the sanctuary. As we participate in this service, we solemnly acknowledge the humility, love, mercy, and obedience that Jesus displayed. While Psalm 22 is sung, everything is removed from the altar in preparation for the Tenebrae service.

Good Friday (March 29 at 11:00a and 7:00p) is a service that began in the early Christian church. It is also called the Order of Tenebrae or Darkness. Black cloth is draped throughout the sanctuary and during the service, light is gradually removed. Scriptural accounts tell the story that brings us closer to the crucifixion of our Savior. As the last bit of light leaves the sanctuary, we hear a loud sound representing the point in history when the tomb was closed. This is not a funeral service for Jesus, but a means of bringing us into repentance and contemplation of the price Jesus' paid for our sins as well as the powerful hope of resurrection. As we enter into the church building, you will notice several prayer stations set up in the Lobby. Please take time to visit them. Experience meditative music 20 minutes before the service with artwork depicting Jesus' life and ministry. We enter and leave in silence.

EASTER WORSHIP (Sunday, March 31 at 7:00a, 9:00a, and 11:00a)

Our **Easter worship services** are times of **great celebration** as we **proclaim Christ's VICTORY** over death, sin, and the devil! We celebrate with scripture, music, and meditation on what GOD has done! Once again, this year we will have **three Easter worship services**:

- **7:00a** An Easter sunrise worship service in the sanctuary with communion, choir (including the *Halleluiah Chorus*), and bells. There will be a children's message and a special children's activity bag available for families when you enter worship.
- 9:00a An Easter worship service of celebration in the sanctuary with communion, choir (including the *Halleluiah Chorus*), orchestra, and bells. There will be a children's message, special children's activity bag for families when you enter worship.
- 11:00a An Easter worship service of celebration in the sanctuary with communion, blending elements of traditional and non-traditional songs and hymns using additional band instruments along with the orchestra and organ with music led by a "Gospel" choir. We will do a mixture of songs including *I Know that My Redeemer Lives, Resurrection Power* and *Christ the Lord is Risen Today.* This service will also include a children's message and special children's activity bag for families when you enter worship.

NOTE: The nursery will be staffed for the 9:00a and 11:00a worship services.

This is a great time to invite someone to worship as we CELEBRATE CHRIST who gives us hope for eternity, peace and great JOY! We are excited to praise HIM with everything we have!




CONNECT BAGS

FAMILY MINISTRY with Jen Clendenen


As we continue our journey toward Easter, I wanted to check in with you and share some exciting updates and events happening at St. Michael.

GOD DOES WORK

In August, an intriguing experiment began. Emmanuel-St. Michael called a pastor to do pastoral work inside the school. There were lots of ideas of what all might be possible with a position like this, but we are all still finding out what God is up to in the midst of our work!

We sing a hymn that speaks to how God calls the disciples to "ventures bold and new," (856:1). Sure enough it was a bold a new task for fisherman, but so much called back to what God had been at work at throughout the Old Testament. We see, in the ministry of the early church, how it was bold and new, but at the same time, so connected to everything that had come before. A beautiful balance, that God works out in the midst of it all.

I have gotten to meet and develop relationships with so many awesome students, and just beginning to scratch the surface of where that takes things. It's all new, in the sense that there aren't many pastors who work in this way. It's different, it's new! Yet, in the midst of that, God was at work, striking a balance between old and new. After praying with a student whose mother was ill, God worked it out that I was in the hospital room later that afternoon. With a serious procedure looming just ahead, God worked a moment very similar to something out of the book of Acts. She wanted to be baptized! There was water, there was word, there was God's promise, delivered in the way it has been for millennia.

This is a wonderful reminder, that in all things, God does truly wonderful work. He brings about fresh, new adventures, and yet shows such great continuity. He is still at work, still delivering His gifts, in the way He always has. It may seem new and different to us, I know it does to me, but it's still so connected to the same wonderful reality: God does good work.



STEWARDSHIP from Christian Money Solutions

Generosity is emphasized throughout the Bible, with numerous passages encouraging believers to give cheerfully and abundantly. Adopting a consistent giving practice aligns with the biblical principles of stewardship and compassion. But let's be honest—sometimes we forget to give. So, here are six ways to become a more consistent giver:

Setting aside specific times for giving reinforces the biblical notion of honoring God with the first fruits of your income (Proverbs 3:9). For many, aligning their time of giving with their paycheck helps maintain consistency and reflect the first fruits principle.

4. Automate your giving.

Leverage technology to keep your giving consistent. Automating your giving through your church's website or other Kingdom-advancing non-profit platform ensures that your contributions are timely and faithful.

5. Track your generosity.

You chase what you track. Therefore, you should consider tracking your generosity. Keeping records of your giving allows you to evaluate your commitment to biblical stewardship and adjust as needed. This also allows you to celebrate what God has allowed you to do with your finances.

6. Pay attention to your generosity's impact.

The Bible is replete with stories of how generosity affects individuals and communities. Acts 20:35 reminds believers, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." By acknowledging the impact of your giving, you align with the biblical principle of selfless and joyful generosity.

Become a consistent giver. By incorporating these principles, you can cultivate a habit of consistent generosity that aligns with the teachings of Scripture and brings glory to God.
